► FRIDAY'S VIRTUAL SPEAKER!



Dr. Ming Wang, MD, PhD

As many of you remember, Dr. Ming Wang, MD, PhD was our club's 2015's Outstanding Nashvillian of the Year for his contributions to the Nashville community. Dr. Wang is the director of Wang Vision 3D Cataract and LASIK Center, a world-renowned laser eye surgeon, and a philanthropist. He is currently working with colleagues from the U.S. and around the world in China, Japan, South Korea, and Italy to discuss Covid-19.

Together, they are building a message to provide guidance on the current situation around the world, the nature of the virus, its treatments, and insights on how to avoid it to stay healthy. Dr. Wang has been a leader in the Nashville business community, patriotic citizen, and bridge builder to bring people together. There are few like him that have this unique capability to speak to our club on this subject.

In addition, Dr. Wang is an active contributor to our Nashville community. He is the founding president of the Tennessee Chinese Chamber of Commerce and an honorary president of the Tennessee American-Chinese Chamber of Commerce. The mission of these two chambers is to help educate Tennessee businesses about China, thus helping Tennessee to increase its export to China. Dr. Wang said, "Tennessee sells \$2 billion-worth of products to China each year, but we purchase ten times as much--\$20 billion--from China. We must change that statistic, and the way to do it is to learn about China, and the opportunities Nashville and Tennessee have to sell what we have to offer to China."

Dr. Wang is the international president of Shanghai Aier Eye Hospital, the largest private eye hospital group in China today, holding 10% of China's entire eye care market. Dr. Wang has helped the Nashville healthcare industry export its products to China, and he co-founded the Tennessee Immigrant and Minority Business Group. Dr. Wang shared, "As an immigrant myself, I am indebted to America for the wonderful opportunities with which I have been blessed; and I want to do what I can to give back to America, my adopted country. To paraphrase President Kennedy, I want to encourage all immigrants to 'ask not what America can do for us, ask what we together can do for America.'"

Dr. Wang's life story inspired a movie role in the blockbuster film "God's not dead" which grossed over \$100 million worldwide. He has donated all of the proceeds from his autobiography "From Darkness to Sight" to the foundation.

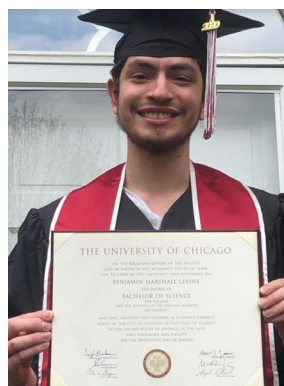
